From the Pastor's Desk

Ask the Pastor Returns

Peace to you! I hope you all had a blessed and restful Thanksgiving! We have so many "talents" and blessings that God has given us and for which we should be grateful. The best way that I know of to show our gratitude to God is to attend Mass, which is call the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. "Eucharist" means "thanksgiving"!

I received some great **Ask the Pastor** questions from one of our 4th grade parishioners. I will answer the first this weekend and work on answer the other two next weekend (stay tuned!). I will do my best in answering!

1) Why do they put purple coverings (purple specific) on the statues on Good Friday?

Answer: We actually put the purple (or "violet") coverings over the statues and other images in the church on the 5th Sunday of Lent, 2 weeks before Easter, and leave them on until the Easter Vigil (the day after Good Friday). During these two weeks the readings and prayers at Mass focus on the increasing conflict and arguments between Jesus and the Jewish leaders and the sufferings that Jesus accepted to save us.

The tradition of veiling all sacred images in the church (crucifix, statues, etc...) from the 5th Sunday of Lent until the Easter Vigil comes from the Gospel of John which tells us that not long before Jesus' death, the Jewish authorities tried to stone Jesus to death. And so, He "hid himself and left the temple" (John 8:59). Therefore, we have a visual reminder during those last two weeks of Lent of the fact that Jesus' divinity (that He was truly God) was "veiled" from human eyes (the Jewish leaders) during the time of His passion and death.

There are three spiritual lessons that covering statues during the last two weeks of Lent teach us. The first is that it shows us that those days are different and special. The purple coverings help us remember the importance of fasting and penance during the next two weeks. We even "fast from seeing" the beautiful statues and crucifix that we are used to seeing at church. Paradoxically, when we fast from visual stimuli, even those images which help us to focus in prayer, our awareness of them is intensified and renewed! This makes the revealing of the cross on Good Friday very powerful. We see with "new eyes" the crucifixion of Jesus and that it is the result of our sins and God's deep love for us.

A second spiritual lesson is that we cover or veil only holy things. Think about it. The chalice which holds the Precious Blood of Jesus after the consecration at Mass is veiled. Oftentimes the tabernacle which reserves the Holy Eucharist is veiled. The altar is "veiled" by the altar cloth(s). When doing Benediction with the Blessed Sacrament, the priest's hands are veiled. The blessed Virgin Mary is always depicted wearing a veil. Religious sisters and nuns are veiled. A bride at a wedding is veiled. All of these things are related.

Another spiritual point is that so often God and His power is hidden from our eyes. This is true on this side of death and eternity. There is a "veil" that prevents us from plainly seeing God, God's plan, the meaning of our suffering, and what happens after death. During Jesus' passion, death, and burial, Jesus passed through the veil that separates us from God and reconciles us to Him. He accomplished this through His Cross and Resurrection. When we put our trust in the Cross of Christ, the veil is lifted, if but for a moment, and we catch glimpses of the glory that God promises to those who love Jesus and follow Him.

Holy Days and Christmas Masses

Friday, December 8th is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary and is a holy day of obligation. Mass times will be 8:15 AM and 7:00 PM that day.

Christmas is also a holy day of obligation and falls on a Monday this year. That means that Sunday, Dec 24 is the 4th Sunday of Advent in the morning and Christmas Eve in the evening. We will have the normal Masses for the 4th Sunday of Advent. For Christmas, we will have a 4 PM Mass on Sunday (Christmas Eve) and 9:30 AM Mass on Christmas morning. Mass attendance, there are two obligations to be fulfilled, the 1st for the Fourth Sunday of Advent, and the 2nd obligation for Christmas. You can fulfill those two obligations by attending one of each Mass (Saturday evening or Sunday morning, then Sunday evening or Monday morning).
