# From the Pastor's Desk

How to Meditate: Advice from St. Francis de Sales

Peace be with you! We are so happy to welcome two new families to our parish! I think that make the count 13 or 14 new families since January 2023. Mark your calendars and come to Sunday Mass on Sept. 8<sup>th</sup> and Fellowship afterwards in the School gym to meet our newest parishioners and welcome them to St. Charles!

Last week I wrote about Christian meditation (a.k.a. "mental prayer") as an essential way to grow closer to God. St. Francis de Sales, a bishop who lived in southeastern France from 1567-1622, is an amazing guide for growing deeper in the practice of prayer. His book, *Introduction to the Devout Life*, is one that I highly recommend to everyone.

St. Francis de Sales' method for mental prayer consists of four parts: Preparation, Meditation, Affections and Resolutions, and Conclusion. The first part, preparation, consists of three points. First place yourself in the presence of God. You can do in several ways, but here are the ones I find most helpful. One: God is in all places even though we don't see Him and so we often forget His presence. Two: Recall that God is present in your heart, the deepest part of you. In Him "we live and move and have our being." Three: Imagine Jesus, in His humanity, being with you. Imagine Him coming into the place you are, pulling up a chair and sitting in front of you. This is not playing "make believe," but rather using our imagination, which is a gift from God, to help us enter the reality of God's presence.

Second, once you have settled down in God's presence, acknowledge Him with reverence. The King of all Creation has lowered Himself to be with you for this time. You can use a phrase from Scripture or from your heart. "Lord, teach me to pray." "Here I am, Lord." "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening."

Third, introduce the subject of the meditation. Maybe it will be a moment from the life of Christ. It could also be a teaching of our Faith. Whatever the subject, simply imagine the scene as if it really took place right before your eyes. Try to imaginatively engage your five senses. What do you see, smell, hear, taste, touch? If the subject of the meditation is abstract (e.g. God's love, His mercy, etc...), them simply focus on the topic.

The second part is called meditation. This is when engage our intellect (that capacity by which we think and reason) on the subject of this time of prayer. Do not move too quickly during this time from point to point or thought to thought. If you come upon a point, consideration, word, or idea which brings appeal, light, or interest, stay with that point for some time. If you try to dwell on a point for a while and it is not working, just calmly continue on to the next point. In the following meditations, I will give you the points for consideration, but when you are praying on your own, you may have to form your own points for consideration.

The third part is called affections and resolutions. During the course of your prayer, your feelings or desires ("affections") may be moved. Some examples of this are: love for God or neighbor, desire for heaven, desire to imitate Jesus Christ or the Saints, wonder, joy, fear, hatred of sin/evil, sadness for our past sins or past hurts. These affections are "signals" of "something happening." Slow down and focus in when you experience these in prayer, because they can indicate something that God wants to bring to our attention and examine with Him.

It is best that our affections lead us to make holy resolutions, that is, plans of action. The more specific the plan, the better. For example, perhaps while considering the suffering that Jesus endured while carrying His cross, you are moved by a desire to console Him. And so, you make a resolution to go out of your way after your time of prayer to call a friend who is in need of encouragement. Or perhaps you are moved to sadness by the memory of saying something rashly which hurt a friend. You resolve then to seek that friend's forgiveness the next time you see them.

The fourth part is the concluding of our prayer, which can include three actions. Thank, offer, and ask. Thank God for the insights, affections, and resolutions given to us in the time of prayer. Even if "nothing

happened," you can thank God for the time He spent with you. Then offer to God your affections and resolutions by uniting them with Jesus' own offering of Himself to the Father. Then ask God for the good things you need: grace, a certain virtue, faithfulness. Pray for the Church, your family, friends, the poor, etc... and conclude by praying the *Our Father* or some other memorized prayer. Be sure to "gather" one or two thoughts or resolutions with you after you conclude your prayer so that you can recall them throughout the rest of the day. St. Francis de Sales calls this a "spiritual bouquet," it is like one or two flowers you can make into a boutonniere to pin on your suit jacket and smell throughout the day. Thus, your prayer will not only benefit you during the time you pray, but will enliven you throughout your whole day.
